Planning & Partnership = Successful Transitions



Noah, a Promise graduate, is excited about starting Kindergarten.

Families face many transitions as their children grow and, as any parent will attest, transitions can be stressful. When a child has a disability, the anxiety brought about by change can become overwhelming. Our goal at The Kelberman Center is to partner with children and families to create a seamless experience as the child moves from one level of service or program to another throughout their lives.

The Brown family began their journey in Atlanta, Georgia when their son Noah was identified with Autism Spectrum Disorder. Their search for services brought them back to the Mohawk Valley and to the Promise Program at Upstate Cerebral Palsy. Lisa and Tom Brown have taken an active role as advocates in planning Noah's education. They meet regularly with the professionals who work with their son sharing their insights, learning how to support Noah's skill development and always keeping communication open and strong. As a result of this team collaboration, Noah made steady gains during his time at Promise.

For the next step in Noah's educational program, the team decided that a year in an integrated preschool classroom would allow Noah the opportunity to generalize his learning in a less restrictive environment before moving to Kindergarten. Throughout this year, Noah's family, the Promise Staff, Integrated Preschool Staff and the home school district worked together to ensure a successful transition to Kindergarten. While in the Integrated Preschool classroom, the staff, parents and school district administration worked together to ensure that similar supports were in place for the next transition. A carefully planned process allowed Noah to visit the classroom he would attend in the fall increasing his contact with the elementary school throughout the year. Coordination of Noah's instructional schedule, careful planning, monitoring and flexibility enabled this team to respond to Noah's changing needs throughout his preschool experience. According to Lisa Brown, Noah's mom, "The efforts of the transition team have had a huge impact, and we look forward to Noah making a smooth transition to Kindergarten." Noah will be attending his home school for Kindergarten in the fall.

The Kelberman Center is committed to ensuring that each individual on the autism spectrum, their families and professionals receive comprehensive, lifespan services and opportunities to realize their full potential. It is the power of people who care coming together in partnership that maximizes the opportunities for smooth transitions that may begin in preschool and continue throughout a person's life. Michael Powers, Psy. D. is a Pediatric Psychologist and the Director for the Center for Children with Special Needs in Tolland, Connecticut. He specializes in the diagnosis, evaluation, and treatment of individuals with autism and related developmental disabilities. He completed his graduate work at Columbia and Rutgers and holds an appointment as an Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychology at the Child Study Center, Yale University. In 1990, he was awarded the Literary Achievement Award by the Autism Society of America for *Children with Autism: A Parent's Guide* (1989).



Sandra DeMyer-Gapin, Ph.D. is a member of the American Psychological Association and has more than 25 years of experience in providing clinical psychological service assessments and evaluations in the field of early childhood and autism spectrum disorders. A former faculty member of Kirkland College in Clinton, New York, Dr. Gapin has served as an adjunct professor of psychology at many institutions of higher learning. She is currently the Director of Psychological Services at Upstate Cerebral Palsy and is an established diagnostician in the field of autism spectrum disorders.

Stephen R. Anderson, Ph.D. is the Executive Director of Summit Educational Resources in Tonawanda, New York. Dr. Anderson is a national expert in the education and treatment of children with autism and related developmental disabilities. 2005 Summer Institute on Autism Hosts International Experts

More than 115 educators, clinicians, parents and area health care professionals filled the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center on July 24th and 25th for The Kelberman Center's 2005 Summer Institute on Autism. With a theme of "Autism Services Across the Lifespan," this year's Institute hosted an internationally recognized group of presenters from the United States and Canada.



Following welcoming remarks by Louis Tehan, Executive Director of Upstate Cerebral Palsy and Dr. Michael Kelberman, President of The Kelberman Center Board of Directors, keynote presenter Chantal Sicile Kira, author and parent of a teenager with autism, provided an insightful, factual and occasionally humorous look at how parents can best advocate for services for their children with autism spectrum disorders. Individual sessions by Dr. Caroline Magyar, Assistant Professor of Pediatrics and Director of the STAART Center at the University of Rochester, Dr. Lori Ernsperger, Dr. Sabrina Freeman & Lorelei Dake, and Thomas Caffrey centered on practical strategies to improve social, behavior and language skills for school age students in both special education and inclusive settings.

Highlights of the Institute were a repeat of last year's breakfast panel "Real Life Questions-Real Life Answers" and a "Meet the Author" book signing (pictured above) reception. The two-day Summer Institute drew attendees from numerous school districts, autism programs and health and human service settings throughout central and upstate New York.

Verbal Behavior Training Scheduled for October 2005

An outstanding and highly regarded closing session offered by Thomas Caffrey, MA at The Kelberman Center's 2005 Summer Autism Institute was so well received by the audience of more than 100 area professionals, that an intense two day follow-up training by Mr. Caffrey has been scheduled for October 2005.

Teaching Verbal Behavior in the Classroom will introduce Upstate Cerebral Palsy's educational and clinical staff to classroom strategies that incorporate principles of both applied behavior analysis (ABA) and Skinner's analysis of verbal behavior and operant conditioning to assist children with language deficits. Mr. Caffrey's extensive work in effectively developing language and functional communication in children with autism spectrum disorders has been shown to promote peer interaction in natural environments. Additionally, this approach has also been extremely effective in decreasing problem behaviors in students while capturing and increasing their motivation in classroom settings. Because Upstate Cerebral Palsy and The Kelberman Center provide evaluation, consultation, education and residential services to more than 500 children with autism spectrum disorders and related disabilities, the
